RECENT HIGHLIGHTS

At the end of January, **Jüri Reinvere's** newest opera "**Minona"** staged by **Hendrik Müller** received its successful premiere at the **Theater Regensburg** in **Germany**. The opera was commissioned by the theatre to celebrate Beethoven's anniversary year. The heroines of the opera are Josephine Brunsvik-Stackelberg, the probable addressee of the famous "Letter to the Immortal Beloved", and her daughter Minona, whose father Beethoven may have been. As with the previous operas, Reinvere wrote the libretto for "Minona" himself.

During January several annual awards were presented to Estonian musicians. The Cultural Endowment of Estonia awarded **Tõnu Kõrvits** the **Grand Prize** for his exceptionally

creative year and numerous performances of his works. **Neeme Järvi** received the **Lifetime Achievement Award** for his invaluable contribution to musical life.

The Estonian Association of the Phonogram Producers named the album "Heino Eller. Symphonic poems" on the Ondine label as Classical Album of the Year. Dedicated to the orchestral music of Eller, it contains some of the composers earliest symphonic works. The CD recorded by the Estonian National Symphony Orchestra under conductor Olari Elts is a ground-breaking introduction to one of the founders of the Estonian school of classical music.

The annual prizes for choral and wind music were announced by the Estonian Choral Association. Riho Esko Maimets was named Choral Composer of the Year and the CD "A Black Birch in Winter", released under MRS Classics, as the Choral Album of the Year, to mention but a few. The latter epitomises the long relationship between David Puderbaugh and Voces Musicales—an American conductor and an Estonian choir collaborating on a recording of modern choral music of the two nations.

UPCOMING EVENTS IN FEBRUARY

On February 3, Tõnu Kaljuste will conduct a portrait concert of Arvo Pärt at the Elbphilharmonie in Hamburg, Germany. The Tallinn Chamber Orchestra together with the Estonian Philharmonic Chamber Choir will perform several of Pärt's best-known and notable works, including "Te Deum", "Adams lament", and "Fratres" with Harry Traksmann as a soloist. The concert is a part of the "Reflektor" concert series which is curated by Manfred Eicher and marks the 50th anniversary of the ECM label.

On February 6, the MustonenFest presents the Novosibirsk Chamber Orchestra and the young Estonian soloists Katariina Maria Kits (violin), Marcel Johannes Kits (cello), and Sten Heinoja (piano) in Ludvig van Beethoven's Concerto for Violin, Cello and Piano in C major, Op. 56. The programme lead by Andres Mustonen also includes music by Felix Mendelssohn, Giya Kancheli, Josef Bardanashvili, and Pyotr Tchaikovsky.

On February 6, ensemble Una Corda featuring Kristi Mühling (Estonian kannel), Liis Viira (harp), and Ene Nael (harpsichord) will give a recital of Baltic contemporary music. Cellist **Theodor Sink** will join the ensemble to premiere a new work by **Tõnu Kõrvits**. The programme also includes **René Eespere's** "Morning of a Sculpture", Ruta Paidere's "Ornamente", **Age Veeroos's** "Chills", and Jonas Paulikas's "Suite".

On February 22, "Hommage a Brillance de Lune" for oboe and organ by **Peeter Vähi** will receive its premiere in **Moscow**. Commissioned by Edition 49, the new work is inspired by Beethoven's "Moonlight Sonata". Elizaveta Babchenko (oboe) and Olesya Rostovskaya (organ) will be the performers.

On February 22, the NHK Symphony Orchestra with its chief conductor Paavo Järvi will give an exclusive concert in Tallinn as a part of its second European tour. The programme consists of Tōru Takemitsu's "How Slow the Wind", Robert Schumann's Cello Concerto in A minor with Sol Gabetta as a soloist, and Anton Bruckner's Symphony No. 7 in E major.

On February 28, the Pärnu City Orchestra features British clarinettist Matthew Hunt as a soloist in the Clarinet Concerto by Aaron Copland. The programme also includes Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No. 4 in B flat Major as well as "Neenia" by Heino Eller. Mikk Murdvee will conduct the orchestra.

On February 28, the Accordion Concerto by Tauno Aints will be premiered at the Temppeliaukio Church in Helsinki, Finland. The performers are Estonian accordionist Mikk Langeproon and Helsinki Chamber Orchestra with James Salomon Kahane conducting. Music by Uuno Klami, Einojuhani Rautavaara, and Dmitri Shostakovich will be presented alongside the new work by Aints.
