Pärnu Music Festival Reaches a New Audience Record, Lepo Sumera Prize Awarded

The 15th Pärnu Music Festival attracted nearly 13,000 visitors to its concerts over ten days, while almost 25,000 viewers worldwide followed the festival's live web broadcasts on Pärnu Music Festival TV. This year's festival program paid tribute to Arvo Pärt, in celebration of his 90th birthday year. The festival's top-class concert program featured world premieres of new works by Estonian composers Erkki-Sven Tüür, Elis Hallik, and Alisson Kruusmaa.

Alongside the festival, the Järvi Academy hosted conducting courses as well as masterclasses for strings, winds, and percussion, where 129 young musicians received training from world-class mentors.



At the Pärnu Music Festival, the Lepo Sumera Composition Prize, established by the Estonian Authors' Society and the Estonian Composers' Union, was awarded to composer Märt-Matis Lill. Lill's scope as a composer is remarkable: in his distinctive authorial style, profound meditativeness is fused with outward drama, sonic sensitivity with figurative sharpness, and introversion with striking theatricality. Previous laureates of the Lepo Sumera Prize include Toivo Tulev, Helena Tulve, Tõnu Kõrvits, Jüri Reinvere, Galina Grigorjeva, Ülo Krigul, Tatjana Kozlova-Johannes, Age Veeroos, and Erkki-Sven Tüür.



The Pärnu Music Festival is one of the best-known international classical music festivals in Estonia and Europe. It combines the Järvi Academy — a workshop platform for young musicians — with a high-level concert program and the Estonian Festival Orchestra, led by Paavo Järvi. The next Pärnu Music Festival will take place on **July 8–18**, **2026**.

Hans Christian Aavik named "Young Artist in Focus" with the Württemberg Chamber Orchestra Heilbronn

The Württemberg Chamber Orchestra Heilbronn (WKO) has announced that Estonian violin sensation Hans Christian Aavik will be its *Young Artist in Focus* for the upcoming 2025/26 season. With his charismatic stage presence, radiant sound, and bold musical vision, Aavik is already captivating audiences across Europe – and now he will bring his artistry to Heilbronn in a series of exciting projects with the WKO.

Aavik first drew international attention after winning the prize at the 2022 Carl Nielsen International Competition. His rapidly growing discography includes a debut orchestral album with conductor Gemma New, pairing Bruch's Violin Concerto with Erkki-Sven Tüür's Violin Concerto No. 2, released on Orchid Classics in May 2025. He also appeared in Deutsche Grammophon's new *Rising Stars* series on STAGE+ and recorded three singles with pianist Karolina Aavik in the label's "Musical Moments" series. The duo's critically acclaimed debut album AETERNUS was recorded at the Arvo Pärt Centre in 2021.



As the WKO's *Young Artist in Focus*, Hans Christian Aavik will appear in multiple concerts throughout the 2025/26 season, offering audiences the chance to experience one of today's most compelling young violinists at the heart of the orchestra's programming. His residency promises a season full of discovery, energy, and unforgettable music-making.

World Premiere of Erkki-Sven Tüür's New Work Leaving Behind at the Bonn Beethovenfest

On September 18, the world premiere of Erkki-Sven Tüür's new work *Leaving Behind* will take place as part of the prestigious Beethovenfest classical music festival in Bonn. The piece for piano and string orchestra will be performed by Georgian pianist Giorgi Gigashvili together with the East-West Chamber Orchestra under the baton of conductor Rostislav Krimer. The concert will be held at Bonn's Pantheon Theatre. Prior to the concert, a discussion will take place featuring composer Erkki-Sven Tüür, conductor Rostislav Krimer, and musicologist Michael Struck-Schloen.



Tüür describes the work as follows: "On a certain level, the music expresses a set of emotions a person must endure when facing the most dramatic changes in life — the loss of a loved one, fleeing from one's homeland, and much more. These situations are often tied to the most violent acts in human history, known as war. A cruel, absurd, and inhuman way of doing politics. This music is also a prayer for all suffering souls."

Ülo Krigul receives the Veljo Tormis Scholarship

At a grand event dedicated to the 95th anniversary of Veljo Tormis, held at the beloved composer's birthplace in Kõrveaia, the Veljo Tormis Fund's 2025 scholarship was awarded. This year's recipient is Ülo Krigul.

Ülo Krigul (b. 1978) is an Estonian composer who graduated with a master's degree in composition from the Estonian Academy of Music and Theatre. He is also a music organizer: he founded the Autumn Festival of the Estonian Academy of Music, and from 2004 to 2014, together with Timo Steiner, he was the artistic director and producer of the annual contemporary music festival Estonian Music Days. In 2019, Krigul was composer-in-residence with the Estonian Philharmonic Chamber Choir.

The Veljo Tormis Fund was established in 2000 under the Estonian National Culture Foundation on the initiative of composer Veljo Tormis and the Estonian Choral Association, with the goal of promoting nationally oriented music. Previous recipients of the Veljo Tormis Scholarship include composers with distinctive styles: Ester Mägi (2004), Rasmus Puur (2020), and Mariliis Valkonen (2023).
