Estonian Music Days Marked 100 Years of the Composers' Union

The world's most in-depth major event dedicated to new Estonian music and our composers — the Estonian Music Days (EMP) — took place this year from April 25 to May 4. The festival was organized by the Estonian Composers' Union, which also celebrated its 100th anniversary. Inspired by this milestone, the festival's theme was *HUNDRED/100*, with Helena Tulve and Timo Steiner serving as artistic directors. The Tartu program was curated by Märt-Matis Lill.

As part of the festival's expanded program EMP+, Liisa Hõbepappel's brand-new chamber opera *The Dustborn* will be staged on May 10 at Viimsi Artium. In addition to numerous concerts, the festival included several informal events, discussions, and reflections curated in collaboration with the Estonian Centre for Contemporary Music (ECCM).



A major highlight was the concert of the legendary **Arditti Quartet**, a flagship ensemble of contemporary music for which hundreds of works have been written over the past 50 years. They offered a substantial concert on May 2, and also gave a masterclass for students at the Estonian Academy of Music and Theatre, encouraging young talents to engage with quartet composition.

The festival's theme reflected the 100-year history of Estonian composers and musicologists, which in turn mirrors the complex history of Estonia itself. A recurring theme has been adapting to volatile circumstances while maintaining artistic and academic excellence and staying open to the world.

Today, the ECU is one of the oldest creative associations in Estonia, with around 130 members. Past chairpersons include notable figures such as Eugen Kapp, Boris Kõrver, Jaan Rääts, Raimo Kangro, Lepo Sumera, and Olav Ehala.



Rasmus Puur's Symphony Wins the LHV New Music Award 2025

As part of the Estonian Music Days festival, the LHV New Music Award 2025 was presented to an outstanding Estonian composer. This year, the prize was awarded to Rasmus Puur for his Symphony (2024). The award ceremony took place on April 25 at the Estonia Concert Hall during a performance by the Estonian National Symphony Orchestra. This marks the second time Puur has received the honor — he was previously awarded in 2021 for his Violin Concerto.

For the first time, a special LHV Innovation Award was also granted, recognizing a composer whose work enriches public and/or environmental discourse with a new dimension. This prize went to Marianna Liik for her work Maaalune, a poetically immersive piece that combines pre-recorded sound, electronics, and acoustic instruments into a compelling artistic unity.




The collaboration between Estonian Music Days and LHV began in 2016 with the goal of recognizing exceptional Estonian compositions with international potential. This year's competition featured 51 new works by 32 Estonian composers, all premiered in 2024. The jury included Märt-Matis Lill (representing the Estonian Composers' Union and serving as jury chair), pianist Kärt Ruubel, Saale Kareda (Director of the Estonian Music Information Centre), conductor Taavi Kull, and last year's laureate Madli Marje Gildemann.

Previous recipients of the award include Liisa Hirsch, Toivo Tulev, Erkki-Sven Tüür, Helena Tulve, Märt-Matis Lill, Rasmus Puur, Jüri Reinvere, Ülo Krigul, and Madli Marje Gildemann.

The evening's musical experience was given by the M4GNET Quartet, who performed the String Quartet by EMIC's first chairman Lepo Sumera.



A pop-up exhibition introduced the early years of EMIC and historical material, including the first publications, photographs and archival documents.

On May 3, 1995, representatives of 15 Estonian music institutions signed the foundation agreement of EMIC in Tallinn. For thirty years, EMIC has been a valuable source of information and a publisher of Estonian music, assisting musicians, concert organisers and all those interested in Estonian music around the world.
